The cold, wet spring weather has finally yielded to warm summer days, and it seems as though we all have home improvement on our minds. Local hardware shops and big-box home stores are packed with people busy planning projects to upgrade their homes and improve their property's curb appeal.

Here at the Stroud Mansion, we are of this same mindset.

In the last edition of *The Fanlight*, we reported that the slate roof will need to be replaced on the historic Stroud Mansion. According to our records, the slate roof now on the building was installed in 1920,

when the mansion was saved from being razed by community-minded citizens. The 93-year-old roof has lasted through decades of rain, sleet, snow, hail, sunshine, hurricanes, and earthquakes – but now it is time replace it.

I, along with the Facilities
Committee, have been working to
gather information about the type of
slate that needs to be used and to find
a contractor who has the knowledge
and skills to complete this daunting
task.

Of course, whomever we find needs to be historically-minded in order to take on this important job. The corner of 9th and Main Streets in downtown Stroudsburg is a busy location, and while it's wonderful that our building is so highly visible, roof replacement will be a tricky job in such a confined space. Just think of all of the attention our beautiful building will receive as the public sees the scaffolding encasing the Stroud Mansion, a hydraulic boom lift (or cherry picker) parked along the sidewalks, and all of the workers on the rooftop.

Anyone who has replaced a roof knows that entire endeavor is no easy task, and there are many considerations and other jobs that end up being added to the project.

The Stroud Mansion is no different; not only will the roof be replaced, but the copper flashing and the masonry Story continues, Page 3

work of the two chimneys need to be addressed. The roof of the 1893 addition on back of the Stroud Mansion also needs to be replaced. After reviewing blueprints from 1935, it appears that the original style of roof on the addition was also slate.

Like so many home improvement undertakings, one project leads to, or hinges on, another project. Because the slate roof on the original Stroud Mansion has begun to fail, water damage has occurred in the third floor military exhibit room. Peeling plaster on the ceiling has prevented this room from being open to the public for two years. This is the last room that will receive a much-needed makeover once the roof is repaired.

As you may recall from previous editions of *The Fanlight*, or from touring our beautiful building, every exhibit room has received a fresh coat of paint, and each exhibit space has been totally overhauled to display better the artifacts of which we are all so proud. Once the roof is replaced, the military room can be repaired and repainted, and its exhibit space can be reopened to the public.

The Facilities Committee has been seeking estimates for the "Raise the Roof" project, and the best estimate at this time is \$110,000. This figure includes the roofs for

both the 1795 Stroud Mansion and the 1893 addition, as well as the copper flashing and the stone work needed on the chimneys. Needless to say, I will be working to secure grant funding to make this large project possible.

As I look to funding sources, my thoughts turn to you, our members. We've all worked hard on events to raise money for archival materials and acid-free supplies to protect the artifacts and archives inside the Stroud Mansion, but now it's time to focus on saving the important structure itself.

A significant part of seeking grant money is to show grantors that the organization's members and friends, as well as the community at large, financially support the project. The more support MCHA has from its members, the better our chances are of securing funding from a major donor.

The Monroe County Historical Association has an established "MCHA Preservation Fund," and donations to this fund not only help directly with these projects but also show your continued commitment to MCHA.

Asking for money is perhaps the hardest part of my job, but if you are able, please make a financial contribution to the MCHA Preservation Fund and help us preserve the building for another 100 years.


