'Passport' to promote trips through local history



Happy New Year! I can't believe that another year is over, and a new one has begun. It's a funny thing to head-up the county historical association — I strive to stay firmly grounded in the past while always looking to the future.

One of the goals for the new year is to raise awareness about the wonderful history we have right in our own backyard. As an organization, it is very important that we not only work to preserve and protect our history, but that we also ensure that the lessons of our history are disseminated throughout the community. Monroe County comprises 611 square miles, and it's our job to make sure that the stories of the rich history within our boundaries are shared with residents and visitors alike.

To that end, we are undertaking a special project to highlight our history. The Monroe County Historic Coalition was created 10 years ago and has representatives from area historical societies who come together on a quarterly basis to discuss historical happenings around Monroe County. This networking group's mission is to foster county history, support historical organizations in the community, share resources with other groups, and work to preserve the historical and cultural landscape of the region.

In fact, the Monroe County Historic Coalition is beginning to expand beyond county borders and now



includes representatives from Pike and Northampton counties. At our October meeting, individuals on behalf of 14 historical groups were present.

For 2013, the main task of the Monroe County Historical Coalition is to create a "Passport to History," sharing all of the historical and cultural sites within Monroe County. It is the hope of the members of the coalition that residents and tourists will take advantage of this all-inclusive booklet to explore the area while learning about the historic sites that dot our landscape.

The "Passport to History"

will include directions to historical sites, photos, and information about the organizations. Passport holders will be encouraged to get their passports stamped after visiting a museum or historical site.

But the free Passport will include more than just buildings; it will share the location of state historical markers, burial locations of famous citizens, and other points of historical interest. The "Passport to History" will be a great activity for out-of-town guests, scout groups, and others.

'Outsider' Artist show a success

The third annual art exhibit and auction fund-raiser was held November 10 at the Shawnee Inn and Golf Resort, a collaboration among MCHA, Hartzell's Auction Gallery and the Kirkwood family of Shawnee Inn.

The "Outside Artists of the Middle Delaware" exhibit displayed 125 paintings in three rooms of Shawnee Inn. The 2012 event was especially well-received, with many individuals from the community lending pieces from their personal collections.

The 'Outsider' artists represented were Justin McCarthy, Robert Rasely, Jack Savitsky and Sterling Strauser.

The galleries were open to the public throughout the day and more than 50 people came to see this amazing collection. A gala dinner with a private viewing, four-course meal and a presentation by James Sittig was held that evening.

The live auction followed the dinner with many individuals bidding in person or by phone on 18 pieces of original artwork by the featured artists.

More than \$4,000 was raised, as this event continues to be a successful fundraiser for MCHA.

The Art and Auction Committee is already planning this year's event — "Women Artists of the Middle Delaware" — which will be in November at Shawnee. Details will be announced in the next edition of *The Fanlight*.



MCHA is very pleased to participate in the "Retain the Rain" Rain Barrel Art Challenge. This community-wide project, organized by the Monroe County Conservation District, the Pocono Arts Council, the Brodhead Watershed Association and the Brodhead Creek Regional Authority, encourages Stroudsburg and East Stroudsburg residents and businesses to place rain barrels at their homes and businesses to help promote water conservation. Twenty rain barrels will be placed throughout the two boroughs.

MCHA board member and retired art teacher Joan Groff accepted the challenge of creating designs for two MCHA rain barrels. Both of Joan's images were chosen, and now one rain barrel will be placed in the gardens of the Stroud Mansion and one at the Driebe Freight Station.

Monroe checks out new servant's room

After all the excitement of the holiday season, it feels good to do just whatever I want.

While perusing back copies of *The Fanlight*, an article on the renovations on the third floor of the Mansion caught my eye. It has been ages since I made a visit to the third floor, so I decided that the servant's bedroom there would be a good place to start.



I found quite a transition from what had been the textile room (now in the colonial kitchen area) to a return to a house servant's sleeping quarters.

The first thing that caught my eye was the bed. I am sure our visitors will be enthralled by its practicality.

The bed is called a trundle bed and from my research I understand that they are still popular in small guest rooms in today's home. They are definitely a clever space-saver as the single low-to-the-floor bed easily slides under the bed above.

I pulled back the covers to examine the roping. Yes, I said roping — no springs here. Ropes were carefully woven around pegs in the bed's frame to provide a base

for a mattress. The bed above the trundle is also roped. Traditionally, the rope would run from the pegs to a sail cloth bordered in eyelets. The stretched cloth is known as sacking cloth ,which I believe would make for a more comfortable night's sleep.

The servant who would retire to this room had the additional comfort of a mattress. Now, if

this wasn't an historic building and museum, I would have investigated for evidence of bed bugs. Early mattresses had a way of attracting vermin, because they were stuffed with corn husks, horsehair, or moss. By colonial times, feather mattresses were more common.

Now, I can imagine what you are thinking. The rhyme "good night, sleep tight, don't let the bed bugs bite" comes to mind. Many associate "sleep tight" with a tightly strung rope bed, but it has been questioned by several sources.

I prefer "sleep thigh," meaning "sleep soundly" without a reference to bed bugs.

I hope you will visit the Stroud Mansion to learn more about the life of a Stroud servant.
